The Importance of Being Earnest is, without doubt, Oscar Wilde's most famous and popular play. It was written at the end of his very creative and prolific period from 1888 - when he published The Little Prince, a collection of short stories for children which we can reasonably presume he wrote for the entertainment of his two sons - to 1895. This was a year of great triumph and even greater disaster. The performances of Earnest were, undoubtedly, an enormous success and, following these, he met his lover, Lord Alfred Douglas, but he later made the mistake of suing Alfred's father, the Marquis of Queensbury, for slander. He famously lost the case, was convicted of gross indecency and imprisoned in Reading Goal for two years. He emerged from this ordeal without money or friends and went into exile in France, dying in 1900 at the age of only 46. It is idle to speculate how many more wonderful plays, poems and stories he might have written had he lived only a century later - it is certain that we are fortunate to have the opportunity of performing Earnest once again.

The story of how two young girls agree to marry two young men who are both named Ernest though neither, apparently, was christened thus, is one of misunderstandings and confusions. Victorian manners and style are integral to the plot and are performed by the cast with attention to detail which has been drilled into them by their Director! They have all taken beautifully to the patterns of speech and movement - so alien to modern ways - and have, in the process, learned a lot about the social history and behaviour of that period.




