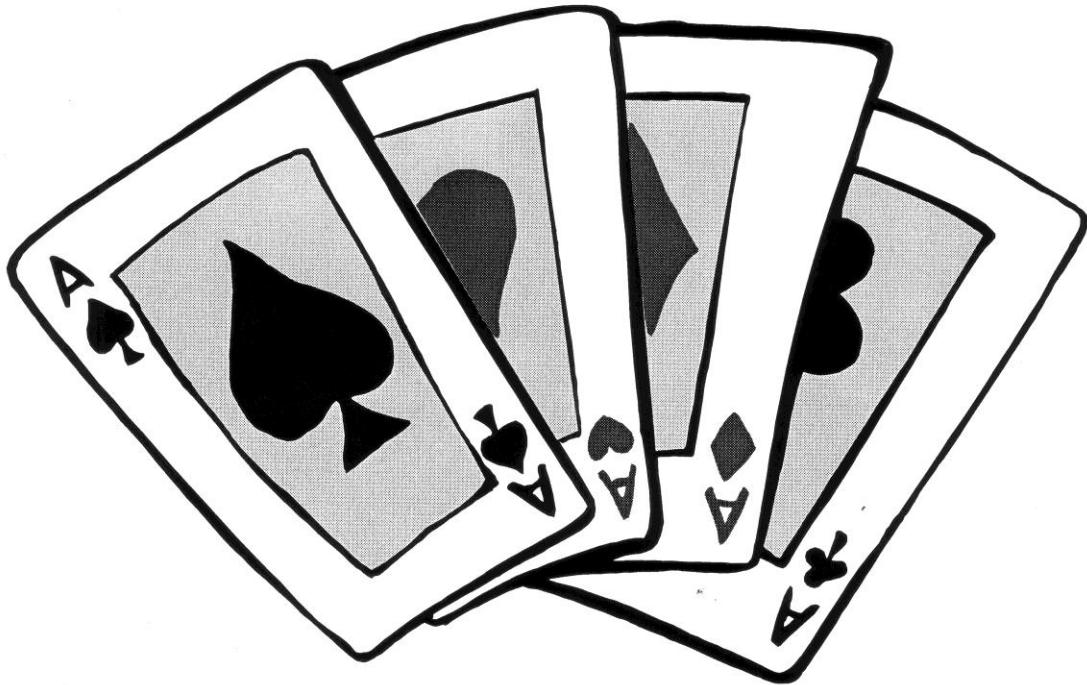

Production History

The Gin Game opened on Broadway on October 6th, 1977 at the John Golden Theatre and ran for 517 performances. The Play was directed by Mike Nichols and starred the married couple Hume Cronyn and Jessica Tandy. The play has come to be closely associated with them. Jessica Tandy won the 1978 Tony Award for Best Actress in a Play.

It was produced in the UK in 1999 with Joss Ackland and Dorothy Tutin at the Savoy Theatre, directed by Frith Banbury.

It was revived on Broadway 1997 at the Lyceum Theatre where it ran for 145 performances. Charles Dunning and Julie Harris co-starred, directed by Charles Nelson Reilly. It received Tony Award nominations for Best Revival of a Play, Leading Actress in a Play and Direction of a Play. Television versions were made in 1981 with Cronyn and Tandy and in 2002 with Dick Van Dyke and Mary Tyler Moore.

The Author

D. L. Coburn was born in Baltimore in 1938. he came to prominence in 1977 with *The Gin Game* which was his first play.

Since then, he has written *Bluewater cottage* (1979), *Guy* (1983), *Nable Adjustment* (1985), *Return to Blue Fin* (1991), *Fear of Darkness* (1995), *Firebrand* (1997) and *The Cause* (1998). He has also written TV pilots for CBS and ABC and several screenplays including *Flights of Angels* (1987), *A Virgin Year* (1991) and *Legal Access* (1994).

Director's Notes

I came upon this play by chance when I was looking for one to replace *Night Must Fall*, which unfortunately I was unable to cast. What struck me immediately was *The Gin Game's* ability to present "Senior Citizens" in an unsentimental way - people who have an emotional and economic past and who, to an extent, are trapped by it.

I was also interested by the play's comments on American welfare, with its insurance-based and privatised provision of care and I noted the parallels with our own care system. Fonsia and Weller would not be funded by the state for a place in an elderly persons' home in this country as they would not be considered eligible for that type of care.

I hope you will find this play amusing, thought-provoking and, possibly, disturbing.
